KIRK NEWS – What's Happening

As many will know, last autumn Cramond Kirk and The Old Kirk and Muirhouse (TOK+M) Sessions agreed to move towards union between the two churches. We'd hoped to hold a congregational meeting before now to vote on accepting the union. This has been stalled by the Presbytery Mission Plan which needs further approval before any Edinburgh churches may unite.

Meanwhile, led by a joint committee formed between the two churches, we're working to prepare for agreement to proceed, both with a union, and subsequently appointing a new Minister - that will take many months.

A union means just that: everything becomes one, but we will have two centres for worship: Cramond Kirk and TOK+M. Our church sanctuary and halls are to remain, while a plan for the TOK+M buildings is to be established before the end of 2025. One Kirk Session will be formed, all finances and responsibilities merged.

Rev Ian Gilmour continues as our Locum Minister and our Interim Moderator is now Rev Dr Martin Scott (see page 3).

There will also be an opportunity to discuss this further at the Congregational AGM on Sunday 12 March.

Rev Dr Martin Scott

Martin grew up in Motherwell and initially studied music at the Royal Scottish Academy. He taught music in Airdrie Academy, then went on to train for ministry and studied theology in Zürich and Durham. He was in local ministry in Jarrow for 5 years before moving to Manchester, where he taught New Testament and Greek, before returning to Scotland. He became a minister of the Church of Scotland, going on to occupy several roles in its service, including Secretary to the Ministries Council and Secretary of the Council of Assembly. He became Chief Executive of Richmond's Hope in 2019, retiring in Dec 2022. Martin is a long-time member of the lona Community and currently Convener of its Council. He has published widely in the field of New Testament, retains a strong interest in music (as a member of the Edinburgh Festival Chorus, a pianist and organist) and still has a season ticket to watch Motherwell FC.

Our editor Carol Anderson died recently. Carol, who lived in Cramond and ran a successful PR and marketing consultancy, willingly offered her expertise to the Grapevine five years ago. With the onset of lockdown in 2020, Carol immediately recognised the need to rally community morale

The Mystery Of The Memorial Window

Cramond Kirk's WW1 war memorial is always pointed out on Doors Open Days.

Last September I confidently told a visitor that Douglas Strachan was responsible for the memorial window and had gifted the Jock Howieson mosaic.

Imagine my surprise when the visitor - knowledgeable about stained glass - equally confidently told me it was not a Strachan window! "The style is wrong." Having seen Strachan's WW1 memorial windows in Dunblane Cathedral. I could see what she meant. We then found a newspaper article citing Oscar Paterson, a well-known Glasgow artist, as the designer; the Imperial War Museum Memorial Register also says this.

I consulted old Kirk Session papers, now in Register House, hoping to solve the mystery of why Strachan's name had come to be associated with the windows. But no, the papers did not mention the designer's name.

However there was an "Order of Divine Service" for Sunday 2 October 1921 for the "unveiling and dedication of the stained-glass window and brass tablet" but to my astonishment no mention at all of the artist's name! I read that the mosaic was "a special gift from the artist".

More research is maybe needed into Oscar Paterson's connection with Cramond?

Many Church of Scotland churches are facing closure and

Carol loved music and for 10 years was the driving force behind the Celtic Festival in Barbados. She was an enthusiastic renovator of houses and gardens, and a board member of Trellis Scotland, a charity promoting therapeutic gardening.

People remember her as "a very kind, community-spirited woman" and "a fantastic neighbour".

"Even when she didn't feel like shining, she made the universe a better place."

The Grapevine sends sincere condolences to Carol's family and her many friends around the world.

In January 2022 I was diagnosed with myeloma, a blood cancer that develops from cells in the bone marrow. Although treatments and prognosis are improving there is currently no cure. I am fortunate to

have such a loving family, and lan Gilmour, Cramond Kirk and so many friends have been incredibly supportive.

However, I want to tell you about my son Andrew and daughter Katherine's efforts in support of the Edinburgh-based charity, Myeloma UK, that funds vital research to make myeloma history.

In October, Andrew ran four marathons - London, Three-Lander (running from Germany, through Switzerland, finishing in Austria), Lausanne, and Lucerne - three being completed in under four hours. His wife Vici supported at all these events.

In September Katherine and 10 friends completed the London Tough Mudder (that describes it admirably), a 10km run over - and through - many obstacles.

Together they raised over £23,000 for Myeloma UK. Additionally, Andrew raised £2,380 for brain injury charity Headway in the London Marathon. A great achievement of which we are very proud.
